

THE KNIGHTS TEMPLAR AND THE MAGNA CARTA

Crusaders set out from Europe in the 11th century to expel the Turks from places in Palestine which were holy to Christians, and in 1099 ejected them from Jerusalem. But pilgrims were still liable to attack by Turkish raiders and in 1118 nine French knights banded together to protect them. The knights were given a plot of land at the Temple of Solomon in Jerusalem as their headquarters, and from this they became known as the Knights Templar. Taking vows of poverty, chastity and obedience, they lived as monks when not at war, inspired by the ideal of fighting for their faith, winning recruits easily from the most important dynastic families. As a consequence, gifts of money and land flowed in and many rewards for the undoubted bravery of the early knights included gifts of land across Europe.

But, by 1291, the last Christian stronghold in the Holy Land had fallen and the Templars were driven out. They had grown wealthy and made enemies and knights were arrested across Europe in 1308. The order was suppressed and the monks were scattered across different monasteries to serve supposed penance for their greed.

In 1312, the Pope formally published an abolition order transferring their properties to the Knights Hospitallers, the modern forerunners of the Order of St. John of Malta. St. John of Malta developed and maintained our ambulance brigade.

The basis for English Common Law was developed by King Henry II and the Templar dynasty of Anjou. When King Richard the Lionheart died in 1199 he was succeeded by his brother King John (1166-1216) who imposed excessive taxation on the English nobility, and confiscated and sold property of the Roman Catholic Church. These and other arbitrary

uses of power were mostly driven by the need to pay for failed foreign wars and by 1214, the Archbishop of Canterbury, Stephen Langton, called on the noblemen to demand a charter of liberties from the King of England. This resulted in the first time in history that a statutory law was imposed upon a monarch by armed force, causing the landmark Magna Carta to be enacted in 1215, the Great Charter of Liberties.

The Magna Carta was promoted, established and maintained by the Knights Templar. Therefore, the preservation and further advancement of constitutional rights, civil rights and the Rule of Law which flow from the Magna Carta, continues to be an essential living historical mission of the Templar Order in modern times.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 19th Departure this evening for your international gateway city. **OVERNIGHT: PLANE**

THURSDAY, JUNE 20TH - Transfer by private coach to the prestigious private members' club, The Sloane Club, where guests are accommodated under the special invitation of member Alexandra Messervy, FRSA, Founder and CEO of The English Manner and former member of The Royal Household of Her Majesty The Queen.

We have the possibilty of checking in and take refreshments before we join together to depart by coach for The Palace of Westminster and a private tour, followed by Afternoon Tea and a Champagne Reception in the House of Lords hosted by Lord Lexden, a well known historian and author specializing

in Anglo-American history and a popular host with our guests. Lord Lexden will talk about the Magna Carta this evening and William Marshall, 1st Earl of Pembroke, a highly significant Knight and Protector of King Henry III from his 9th birthday, who is buried in Temple Church. The Marshall Protectorate repeatedly reissued the Magna Carts from 1216 to 1255, finally instilling it as the basis for all future government of England (and, leading from this, the Bill of Rights of the United States of course!).

We return to the Sloane Club in the early evening and guests will be free to dine as they wish, perhaps in the delightful bar or formal dining room, or nearby at restaurants of note such as Caraffini, Como Lario, Colbert and Cote. (T) OVERNIGHT: THE SLOANE CLUB

FRIDAY, JUNE 21st - Departing after breakfast, we visit Middle Temple for morning coffee and biscuits and a private guided tour followed by lunch in the Temple Hall, joined by lawyer Alastair Murdie. The central domain of the Knights in London was the land surrounding the Temple Church, Chancery Lane and the Southampton Buildings, all owned by the Knights of the Temple of Solomon. From the 13th century these areas have been heavily populated by prominent lawyers who lived and worked there originally as the Templar

advisors, and the Inns of Court of Middle and Inner Temple surround the shared courtyard of Temple Church.

This afternoon, enjoy a formal guided tour of Temple Church, the headquarters of the 2nd Commandery of



the Knights Templar Order in London and where King John was held to account by the Knights in full battle armour in January 1215 and featured in the film *The Da Vinci Code* in 2006.

This will be followed

by a visit to the Worshipful Company of Bowyers and Fletchers (bow and arrowmakers) tour, and a talk on the medieval archer and the weapons used in the Crusades and beyond, and afternoon tea at Cutlers' Hall.

SATURDAY, JUNE 22ND - Departing after breakfast we drive to the Welsh borders with a stop at Runnymede - where King John signed the Magna Carta on June 15th 1215 – and the Runnymede forest which also has an important Charter. The Magna Carta Memorial in Long Mede was designed by Sir Edward Maufe and erected by the American Bar Association in 1957. King John used nearby Windsor Castle for negotiations with the Knights and whilst guests will have visited the Castle before, we will drive by the Long Ride

to afford a very special view of this magnificent stronghold.

Four exemplifications of the original charter remain in existence, in the British Library, Salisbury and Lincoln Cathedrals, and there are copies of subsequent charters reissued in the USA and Australia, and the Palace of Westminster. A chance to take morning coffee at the Magna Carta café before we head for the scenic and largely unspoilt countryside of the Cotswolds, incorporating



parts of Herefordshire, Worcestershire, Gloucestershire, Oxfordshire and Warwickshire. We will stay at the luxurious but understated 17th Century Dormy House Hotel, and a firm favorite of our traveling guests and one of the best loved country house hotels. In the same ownership since 1977, there are both easy and formal dining options and 38 beautifully designed rooms and suites. Truly a Cotswold gem, with great service and attention to detail. For the healthy, a pool and spa! We meet for dinner this evening in the Potting Shed restaurant. (B, D) THE DORMY HOUSE HOTEL

SUNDAY, JUNE 23RD - Departing after an early breakfast, we make a special visit to Garway in the Welsh borders. Here we will find St. Michael's church, with the only visible surviving circular nave in England, at this important Knights Templar location. Significantly, 3 of the parties to the charter of the Magna Carta were nobles of Hereford and the area of the first Templar

headquarters, the Commandery at Garway.

There has been a church here for over 1400 years, the first stone building was erected in 1180 by the Knights Templar, who were given land by Henry II. The Church Tower was separate and used as a refuge (so it could be defended in the event of an armed raid) and the when

the Templars were dissolved, the Knights Hospitaller built the very fine Chancel roof, owning the church and manor until the dissolution of the monasteries in 1540. There are many masons marks on the stonework and these reflect a Middle Eastern influence; a swaztike is carved on the south wall, which was originally a sign for good luck and prosperity; and a green man decorates the original Templar chancel arch. In the grounds of the private farmhouse next door is a large dovecote built by Brother Richard in 1326 and the farmhouse itself is built on the site of the preceptory (where the Templars lived and worked). There is a holy well in the churchyard.

This afternoon, we visit the award winning inn just a mile away, for lunch at the Bell at Skenfrith, before visting the significant Hereford Cathedral. Here we will be given a guided tour of the Cathedral, a dis-

cussion on Magna Carta in the Marches, and Mappa Mundi with a private tea afterwards in the College Hall. A copy of the Magna Carta is occasionally displayed alongside the Mappa Mundi.

Hereford Cathedral is the birthplace of the world renowned Three Choirs Festival and is home to the Mappa Mundi. It has the largest surviving medieval chained library with some of the finest examples of art and architecture from Norman times.

This evening, after a fairly long day, guests will be free to dine at leisure, perhaps choosing one of the lighter bar options. (B, L) THE DORMY HOUSE HOTEL

Monday, June 24TH - The Manor of Baddesley Clinton was owned by Sir Edward Ferrers, original Templar knight, and has a strong Roman Catholic association with the Gunpowder Plot (Temple Church

and Inns of Court), and Coughton Court.

Nearby is the tiny hamlet of Temple Balsall where we visit the Parish Church for a guided tour and talk, followed by a visit to the Temple Hall, with a private catered lunch.

HEREFORD CATHEDRAL

Temple Balsall was founded by the Knights Templar (Roger de Mowbray, son of Norman Knight Nigel d'Aubigny, favored by Henry I) around 1146, and for almost 200 years was their preceptor, or headquarters. From here, they ruled Warwickshire and parts of Leicestershire and the preceptor building still exists within the present Old Hall, where we will enjoy lunch.

The current Rector of the parish church of St. Mary, Revd Kathy, will give us a talk and guided tour. The Old Hall is the oldest building and is an extremely rare example of early timber-framing. It certainly existed by 1185 and provided shared accommodation for the Knights. The Knights Hospitallers built the unusual church in the 13th century and it was restored by the famous Sir Gilbert Scott in the 19th century. We will also find delightful almshouses dating from 1679.

From here, we visit the important All Saint's Church at Burton Dassett, noted for its medieval wall paintings and connection to the Knights Templar. We learn of the Knights of nearby Temple Herdwycke (now

incorporated into the village of Kineton nearby), which is just a few miles away from Alexandra's own home at Tysoe, another ancient manorial settlement with an 11th century church and the nearby Compton Winyates Manor house dating to the 1400s. The Templars of Balsall received gifts of land at Tysoe (known as Temple Tysoe) granted by Henry de Clinton (Baddesley Clinton) and Robert de Stafford in 1185.

SUDELEY CASTLE

The houses of Lower Tysoe date from the 16th century with the church building from the 11th century. Tysoe Manor dates from the 1300s and we know that the settlement included a coinage and important market. The road leading from Lower Tysoe was formed by a path to Herdwycke, via a windmill which was said to be in situ in the 14th century. The Domesday Survey confirms a settlement in 1086 with a mill and land adjoining. Lord Harold de Sudeley owned the land at Burton Dassett and the first recorded history of the village dates back to 1087. Ralph de Sudeley, who built Sudeley Castle, gave the church's chancel arch

in the 12th century and the family continued it's patronage with additional development, including the installation of a stained glass window which survived until the 18th century. On the death of the childless Baron Sudeley, the manor was divided between his two sisters, passing to the Belknap family in the 16th century. Interestingly, a grandson married

a Throckmorton of Coughton Court, implicated in the Gunpowder Plot, which connects directly back to the Magna Carta and Knights Templar! Burton Dassett became infamous in the Battle of Edgehill in 1642 when Civil War raged the area. It is said that Oliver Cromwell viewed the battle from the Burton Dassett hills.

It is believed that the strong association with the Templars lays foundation to the claim that there is a connection here with the Ark of the Covenant. Many years have been spent searching for the Ark which contained two stone tablets with the ten commandments inscribed. In his book, *The Templars and the*

Ark of the Covenant, author Graham Philips/Simon & Schuster states that the Knights Templar of Herdwycke brought the Ark to England following their defeat by the Saracens in the 12th century. He believes that one of the two slabs of stone have been found, identified with a form of sandstone found on Mount Sinai, and discovered in the walls of an old

Holy Well in the village of Napton on the Hill, nearby. When Sir Walter Raleigh visited the village in 1600, he hired men to excavate the ruins of the Herdwycke chapel in the belief the Templars had buried treasure there. Nothing was found. The chapel in modern times has been renovated as a domestic dwelling. We meet for dinner in the Potting Shed once again. (B, L, D) THE DORMY HOUSE HOTEL

TUESDAY, JUNE 25TH - This morning we depart to visit the historic catholic stronghold, the delightful Coughton Court. Home of the Throckmortons and implicated in the Gunpowder Plot, we will be able to tour the

interesting collections and history, including the gown worn by Mary Queen of Scots at her execution and needlework by Queen Catherine of Aragon. Home to the family since the 1400s, the gardens here have been magnificently restored



and redesigned by Clare Maclaren -Throckmorton QC and her award winning RHS Chelsea medal designer daughter, Christina Williams.

The café and gift shop of this National Trust gem are a delight, and we will be able to take lunch here before we depart for a brief stop at The Tithe Barn at Middle Littleton, an outstanding rare example of a medieval barn close to the monastic settlements of Cleeve Prior, Abbots Morton, Throckmorton, and

Abbots Salford in Templar Worcestershire.

This evening, we will dine at a local inn dating from the 1600s, The Ebrington Arms. Located just outside Chipping Campden, the inn offers a delightful menu, with renowned ales, good wines and a lovely ambiance. (B, D) THE DORMY HOUSE HOTEL

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 26[™] - We begin our day with a morning of shopping and sightseeing today in the historic village of Broadway before visiting the nearby parish of Temple Guiting and the hamlets of Kineton

and Ford and Sudeley Castle. Lunch at the Cotswold Pub of the Year, The Plough Inn at Ford. This evening, we enjoy a farewell dinner together and say our goodbyes. (B, D) THE DORMY HOUSE HOTEL

THURSDAY, JUNE 27TH - Morning transfers to London for returning flights to the US.
