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
UP ON THE DOWNS

I spent my childhood among the chalk hills of Sussex - the South Downs. Going on long family walks around Arundel Park, I remember thinking at the time - why are they called "Downs" when they so obviously go up? In later years, I have come to realise that, like so many things, it is just a matter of perspective - one man's down is another man's up!

For the ancient Britons, the people who lived here before the Romans, before the Celts, they would definitely have been "downs." These were the stone-age people who constructed Stonehenge and these chalk ridges were an essential part of their daily life. They lived on top of them and travelled on top of them - for them every-thing around them was down.

The south of England is laced with a network of theses chalk ridges (see the map inset) and they provided the "highway" system of the time. The surrounding valleys were dense with forests, undergrowth and marshlands, but the top of the chalk was dry and clear - trees find it hard to take root in the thin soil covering. It was also on the tops of the hills that they built their "hill-forts." There are many of these ancient earthworks perched on hill tops along the ridges. They would select a suitable hill, build an earth wall and ditch surrounding the top (probably with a wooden stockade fence on top of the earth wall), providing protection for both the people and their domestic animals.

It is undoubtedly no coincidence that Stonehenge is located on Salisbury Plain, where 5 of these chalk ridges meet (the North Downs, the South Downs, The Chiltern Hills, the Marlborough Downs and the Wiltshire Downs). It was the builders of Stonehenge that used these chalk highways to travel to the festivals that were held at the monument. Tribes would travel from all over the country to gather for important rituals and celebrations,



but there was another important feature of the chalk - flint. Flint is formed under pressure inside beds of sedimentary rock, like chalk. It is actually made up of thousands of tiny quartz crystals compacted together. Many of the ancient hill forts have flint mines close by, as the flint was used to make tools. When flint is split (knapped is the technical term) it forms a very sharp edge, perfect for arrow and spear heads and even small axes.

The thin soil on top of the chalk can be quite easily removed, exposing the bright white surface underneath, providing another notable feature of this uniquely English landscape. Chalk figures, such as the Uffington White Horse pictured here. There are many such works of art, ranging in age from prehistoric to modern day, from ancient giants to military coats of arms.

The Chalk is still used these days by hikers following the ancient tracks. There is something very special about being "Up on the Downs." There is a sense of freedom, of being able to let your mind and spirit wander freely, with sheep grazing peacefully under a wide open blue summer sky and the skylarks diving between the cotton wool clouds.

TURNING POINTS - WITTENBERG

An occasional series, in which we pinpoint people or events that have changed the course of history. Bearing in mind that nothing happens in isolation - momentous events are always the product of things that came before and, as Sir Isaac Newton modestly pointed out, all great inventors, artists and thinkers owe a debt to those who paved the way for them - "we are all standing on the shoulders of giants."

On October 31, 1517, legend has it that the priest and scholar Martin Luther approached the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany, and nailed a piece of paper to it containing Ninety-five theses - revolutionary opinions that would begin the Protestant Reformation.

Or maybe he didn't! Modern scholarship has cast doubt on the accuracy of the traditional account. Joan Acocella, writing in the *New Yorker* states: "Not only were there no eyewitnesses; Luther himself, ordinarily an enthusiastic self-dramatizer, was vague on what had happened. He remembered drawing up a list of Ninety-five theses around the date in question, but, as for what he did with it, all he was sure of was that he sent it to the local archbishop."

In the final analysis, it matters little how the document was transmitted - although there is a certain dramatic flair to the "nailed to the door" story - the fact that it was written and disseminated was enough to set in motion a chain of events that changed the world. In 1521, Luther was excommunicated for his refusal to back down on his Ninety-five proposals for reform, and was subject to the Edict of Worms, issued by the Holy Roman Emperor, Charles V. This declared Luther an outlaw and a heretic and gave



anyone the right to execute him without consequence. Protected by Prince Frederick, he began his 10 year task of translating the New Testament into German, which he undertook in Wartburg Castle (pictured here). In 1529 Charles V revoked a provision of the Edict of Worms that had allowed individual state rulers to decide whether to enforce it or not. Many of them protested this and became known as the "Protestants." The rest, as they say, is history.

MORE ROYAL MEMORIES

I never personally met Queen Elizabeth II - but both my mother and my grandfather did. My grandfather was an Air Chief Marshall in the Royal Air Force and was the head of Fighter Command, just after the end of the Second World War. When he retired from active duty, in recognition of his service to his country, he was appointed as the Bath King at Arms, the head of the Knights of the Order of the Bath.



There are two such orders of chivalry in England - the Knights of the Order of the Garter (whose chapel is in St George's Chapel at Windsor Castle) and the Knights



of the Order of the Bath (whose chapel is the Henry VII chapel at the extreme east end of Westminster Abbey) and membership of one of these orders is one of the highest honours to which an English man (or these days woman) can aspire.

The top picture on the right shows my grandfather (Sir James Milne Robb) in the full ceremonial regalia of the Bath King of Arms, with a young Queen Elizabeth.

The bottom picture on the left, shows him escorting my mother to a garden party at Buckingham Palace to be presented to the Queen (The Queen was only 4 years older than my mother!)



IN MEMORIAM - HER MAJESTY QUEEN ELIZABETH II by Alexandra Messervy

Just a few short months ago, Britain was joined by much of the world in celebrating the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, Britain's longest-reigning monarch. Whilst everyone understood her significant age, no one believed that one day we would be without her wise counsel and guiding presence, yet at the beginning of September, that period of readjustment and reconfiguration began abruptly when the late Queen finally gave in to anno domini and passed the baton of the British crown to her son, His Majesty King Charles III.

A press article commented after the events of 8th September that Her Majesty was an 'emblem of our time' which has never been so true. Queen Elizabeth lived through a World War, an abdication and the early death of her father which in itself brought about huge social and economic changes. From the British car industry to aircraft manufacture and the rise of technological advances in every sector, to the strengthen-



ing of Commonwealth ties and the advancement of education, there have probably been more significant changes in the last 70 years in terms of society than ever before. And she handled them all with equanimity and grace.

There will not be many amongst us who can remember any monarch other than the late Queen and the emotional outpouring across the country was staggering. At one point the line to wait and pay respects to the Queen lying in state was 10 miles long, stretching from Westminster Abbey all the way along the river to Southwark Park. At its longest, people stood in the queue for more than 24 hours, many waited all night. At least 250,000 people filed past the coffin in the 4 days that it was lying in state. Tributes and flowers were left at churches all over the country - we found the one of the left against the railings



hurches all over the country - we found the one of the left against the railings in front of Winchester Cathedral. One comment that really summed up the national temperament was the person who said "it's like the whole country's favourite granny just passed away."


Following the lying in state came the funeral - the first full state funeral since Sir Winston Churchill's in 1965. To the family, the gathered heads of state from the Commonwealth and all over the world, David Hoyle, the Dean of Westminster Abbey said "Here, where Queen Elizabeth was married and crowned, we gather from across the nation, from the Commonwealth, and from the nations of the world, to mourn our loss, to remember her long life of selfless service, and in sure confidence to commit her to the mercy of God our maker and redeemer," Never was a truer word spoken.

Alexandra Messervy was a member of the Royal Household of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in the 1980s and 90s and helped to plan and orchestrate state banquets, official and private events and much more. She will bring her unique royal knowledge to bear accompanying our tour in September to pay homage to the life of the late monarch and to pay our respects on the first anniversary of her death. **Queen Elizabeth II - An Emblem of Our Time,** runs from September 4th - 14th, 2023.

THE WORLD CUP

"The World Cup of what?," I hear you ask! Funnily enough, the US is the only place on the planet where you would hear that question. For everyone else there is only one "World Cup" - football . . . I mean soccer. You see, over here, you can't even get the name right! Other sports have to be qualified: the World Cup of Rugby, the Cricket World Cup, etc., but for football it is just "the World Cup."

It takes place every 4 years (this year is the 22nd such event) and 211 different countries take part. That is pretty astounding when you consider that there are only 193 member states in the United Nations! Some of that discrepancy can be accounted for by things like the fact that the United Kingdom is represented at the UN as one member state, but in some international competitions, takes part as 4 different countries (England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland).

The competition also has the largest television audience of any event anywhere. FIFA, the organising body, said that the 2018 World Cup was watched by 3.57 billion people - that represents over half of the global population aged 4 and above.

Through qualifying matches over the last 3 years, the original 211 teams have been pared down to just 32, who will meet for the final phase of the competition in Qatar between November 20 and December 18 this year. This, in itself, is very unusual as the whole event traditionally happens in the summer. The reason for the change of timing is, of course, that it would be impossible to play serious football in the heat of a Qatari summer. However, the very fact the Qatar was even considered as a host for the championship, let alone was actually awarded the event, has caused many raised eyebrows and serious allegations of misconduct in the upper echelons of the world football governing body - none of which, I hasten to add, have been proven.
